

Global Financial Advisory Services, Inc. is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment adviser. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you to understand the differences. Free and simple tools are available to research firms and financial professionals at [Investor.gov/CRS](http://Investor.gov/CRS), which also provides educational materials about broker-dealers, investment advisers, and investing.

***What investment services and advice can you provide me?***

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We offer investment advisory services to retail investors, which principally include non-discretionary investment management, financial planning services, and third-party advisory services. When providing non-discretionary advisory services, you make the ultimate decision regarding the purchase or sale of investments. Our advice is not limited to certain types of investments, but we generally retain third-party advisers that focus on managing portfolios comprised of mutual funds. We do not offer proprietary products. We do not have a minimum account size or investment amount to retain or maintain our advisory services.

Regular monitoring of your account(s) is included as part of our standard investment management services, with reviews typically occurring at least quarterly. It is important that you keep us apprised of your financial situation so we can conduct more frequent reviews if necessary.

***What fees will I pay?***

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Retail investors will generally incur the following fees charged by us: investment management fees based on a percentage of your assets under our management (which generally range from 0.40% to 1.00% per annum), or financial planning fees based on an hourly rate of up to \$250 per hour. Clients utilizing the services of a third-party adviser are additionally (or alternatively) charged an asset-based administrative or advisory fee that generally ranges from 0.15% to 1.00% per annum, depending on the specific third-party adviser and the services received. Investment management fees are charged quarterly in advance, and financial planning fees are charged in arrears. The specific fee billing mechanics of a third-party adviser may differ. In addition, retail investors will also generally incur the following fees and costs charged by third-parties: custodian fees, account maintenance fees, product expenses such as internal expense ratios, and transaction charges.

When we charge an asset-based fee, the more assets there are in your account(s), the more you will pay in fees, and we may therefore have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account(s). When we charge an hourly fee, the more time we incur in performing our services, the more you will pay in fees, and we may therefore have an incentive to be less efficient in performing services for you.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

***What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?***

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When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means.

The custodian(s) we recommend provide us various products and services that are intended to directly benefit you, us, or both of us. To the extent a custodian provides us products or services that don't directly benefit you, this creates an incentive to recommend that custodian. To the extent you purchase an insurance product from one of our advisors through their affiliation with an insurance company, you will pay an ordinary and customary commission. This is a conflict of interest due to the additional compensation that will be received. The third-party investment advisers we recommend provide us certain benefits, such as due diligence and educational seminars along with attendance expense reimbursements, financial and marketing assistance, and the use of certain software. In addition, certain third-party advisers pay us referral fees. This creates an incentive to recommend a third-party investment adviser. ***How do your financial professionals make money?***

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Our financial professionals are compensated based on the amount of client assets they service or refer to a third-party adviser (for asset-based fees and referral fees), or the time and complexity required to meet a client's needs (for hourly fees). If an insurance product is purchased through one of our financial professionals, such financial professionals will earn an ordinary and customary commission as a result. If you utilize the services of one of our affiliates (Global Business Management, Inc. and Global Tax & Accounting, Inc.), our owners will earn additional fees for such services. These are conflicts of interest due to the additional compensation that will be received.
